Immobilization of Photosensitizers on Semiconductor Surfaces

Starting date: August 2018 or later Suitable for: Master thesis

The project will be done in collaboration with Dr. Sonia Dsoke (IAM - ESS).

Semiconductor nanoparticles are considered appealing catalysts, since they combine high surface area with excellent stability and an easy recovery. They have been used successfully as photocatalysts, ^[1] however the band-gap of most of them is too high in energy to absorb visible-light directly. When the semiconductor nanoparticle is decorated with a ligh-harvesting antenna or photosensitizer (*PS*) and an efficient electron transfer occurs, the energy of light is sufficient to excite the active semiconductor. Heterogeneous molecular photocatalysis provides a potential opportunity to mimic natural photosynthesis with high efficiency. ^[2]
